ARCHITECT CAMPBELL NAMED DISTINGUISHED ALUM FOR 2012



Richard Campbell

A California architect who helped with the Pearl Harbor memorial and who has been heavily involved in charitable support for children is this year's recipient of the Ames High School Alumni Association's Distinguished Alumni Award.

He is Richard B. (Dick) Campbell (AHS 1955) of Palo Alto, CA.

Alumni Association president Jack Smalling said Campbell was selected because of his career-long work in three areas: with the US Navy, as an architect and with

his public service and charitable efforts on behalf of children at the Stanford University hospital.

Professionally, Campbell has worked as an architect for nearly 50 years and is still on the job. Since 1984 he has been a partner with an architectural firm in Palo Alto, which has been responsible for designing and building several major buildings on the campus of Stanford University.

His latest and most notable achievement was to replace the Stanford football stadium, on a 90-year-old site, with a new 51,000-seat facility in less than 10 months.

Earlier in his naval career, Campbell was project manager for the Memorial for the USS Arizona, sunk at Pearl Harbor in 1941 with loss of 1,177 sailors and officers.

During the last 30 years, he has volunteered his time with community and church planning projects in San Francisco, Oakland and Los Altos.

Campbell also spent 17 years working on a charity that generated as much as \$300,000 annually to help pay medical costs for children whose parents could not afford treatment at the Stanford Children's Hospital.

His main assignment was to design and construct backdrops for major events. Campbell said he got his initial training in this area while a student at Iowa State (1955 -1960) building VEISHEA floats for his Phi Delta Theta fraternity.

From 1972 to 1989, Dick hatched ideas, designed backdrops (or stages) that were 80 feet wide and as much as 24 feet high. He then supervised their construction. It has been estimated that he devoted 8,500 hours of volunteer labor during that time.

Themes for the backdrops ranged from a Taj Mahal motif to a Roman villa to the façade of a Victorian home. In 1980 he created a full scale replica of a Ford Tri-Motor airplane from the 1930s.

Shortly after he took on the assignment, he came to be known as "Captain Backdrop."

Charity organizers annually credited Campbell with setting the tone for a successful event.

Dick's philanthropic efforts also extend to cancer research. He and wife Marcia (Wilsie), also AHS-1955, have been major supporters of the Relay for Life Cancer Walk in Palo Alto. They lost their oldest daughter in March 2007 to the disease and annually sponsor a team in her honor in the walk.

In 2011 Dick and Marcia took total charge of the annual Survivors' Walk for Los Altos. Besides all of the logistics, they arranged for a squadron of 72 doves to do a fly-past and a sweeping turn in formation as a tribute to cancer survivors and their courage.

As Ames High students, Dick and Marcia were both members of Homeroom 113 with Ray Smalling presiding.

Between 1952-55 Dick was class president, homeroom president and on student council for two years. He was also in football for three years, track for two and In Hi-Y for three years, where he served as president as a senior.

About his Ames High experience, Campbell said he only first realized in college "how well I was prepared to excel. . . because of the educational opportunities and the outstanding, dedicated teachers."

He also praised boys adviser Everett Ritland, who suggested he apply for a NROTC scholarship – at a time when "I had never even seen an ocean." The leadership skills learned in the Navy, Campbell said, "helped me immeasurably in my subsequent practice of Architecture."

Smalling said that Campbell's nomination was supported by 14 persons, including professional architects, clients, charity organizers and five Ames High graduates.

Campbell is the twenty-third Ames High School graduate to receive the Distinguished Alumni Award since it was established in 1990.

The honor was presented as part of the annual Ames High School Athletic Hall of Fame dinner on Thursday, October 11.

Dick and Marcia recently celebrated their 52nd wedding anniversary.

Lloyd Kester, '42 was a two sport star for Ames High School and one of the very few athletes who was all-state in two sports. But even rarer is the athlete who can garner such accolades in his first year in one of those activities. Lloyd was a starting forward on the basketball team, was voted the team's most valuable player and was selected on the all-conference and all-state teams. As an end on Coach Ken Wells' football team in 1941, this first-year player was first-team all-conference and was selected for the prestigious IDPA all-state team as well. Lloyd was a true team player in every sense.

Bonnie Gagnier Beckerich, '79 was a very talented, dedicated and hard-working gymnast. Perhaps no team in the history of Iowa Girls' gymnastics dominated during the late 1970s like Ames did. From 1976-79 Ames piled up a dual record of 25 wins and 1 loss. They won 3 conference and district championships, a state runner-up and a state championship title. Bonnie was the leading performer for the Little Cyclones during that impressive run in the all-around, bars, beam and vault. Her fondest memory is when she won the 1977 state all-around championship her sophomore year. She was also a state champion in the uneven parallel bars as well. These are just a few of the many accomplishments she achieved during her outstanding gymnastics career at Ames High.

Steven Dreyer, '87 is one of Ames High's graduates to make the professional "Big Leagues" in baseball. He had his finest season as a senior on a team that posted one of Ames High's best records ever going 28-2. He finished with a .333 batting average, hit 8 homeruns, went 6-0 as a starting pitcher and posted a stellar 1.27 ERA. After earning all-conference honors at Ames High,

Steve then moved on to further develop his pitching career at the University of Northern Iowa. In 1990, he was drafted in the 8th round by the Texas Rangers. His major league career had some interesting highlights that included relieving Nolan Ryan in Nolan's last game ever in 1993 as well as getting the last out ever on George Brett. One of Steve's favorite memories during his Ames High career was quite simply the "fun" he had on the 1987 team.

Lee Sargent, '64 distinguished himself during his track career as one of the greatest pole vaulters ever to compete for Ames High School. Three generations of pole vaulting in his family most likely contributed to his outstanding vaulting career at AHS. Not only did Lee win two state vaulting championships and a Drake Relays championship, but he also set seven major meet records and a state record during his two-year varsity career. Lee continued vaulting at Iowa State University. Following college, Lee became the CEO of Todd and Sargent locally. One of his favorite memories is being a part of the great Hi Covey track era at Ames High.

Doran Geise, '78 was a three sport athlete who excelled in football, basketball and track at Ames High School. In the sport of football he was a team captain, team most valuable player, 1st team all-conference, all-state second team and a member of the Iowa Shrine Bowl team. In basketball Doran was a team captain and one of Ames leading scorers and rebounders. In track he still ranks in the top five with a discus throw of 164 feet and one inch. Doran continued on to play football at the University of Northern Iowa and then finished his college football career as a "Big Cyclone" at Iowa State University.

John Sletten, Coach, is definitely a track coaching legend at Ames High School. John coached boys' cross-country running at AHS for 37 years. During that tenure he guided Ames to 17 conference titles, 15 district championships, 3 state runner-up and 5 state championships. Even more amazing is his 41 years as the head coach of the Ames High boys' track team. During this time, his teams won 24 conference championships, 18 district championships, 8 state indoor and 9 state outdoor championships. In addition to the success of his teams, John has won numerous coaching honors. In retirement, John continues to help the Little Cyclones as a volunteer track coach, basketball statistician, football timer and AHS Hall of Fame researcher.

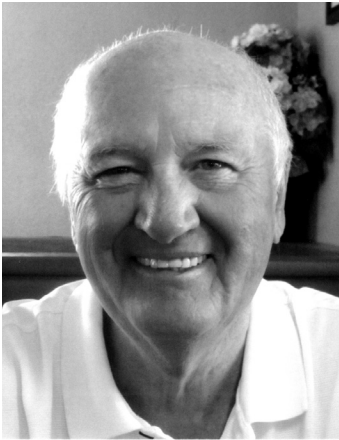

Ames Aims High too...

"You're from Ames? I didn't think anyone was from Ames!" This has been a frequent comment from Ames friends upon hearing I was born and raised in Ames, Iowa. So what has it been like living and working in my hometown? First, I soon became aware there were many other "natives." Whether at work, family activities or community organizations, I realized how many people who grew up in Ames are

living here and contribute in many ways.

Growing up we all knew Ames was the best town anywhere. We had the best of everything--schools, sports, stores and VEISHEA every spring. After graduating from AHS in 1960 and attending ISU, I graduated from Mankato State College (now Minnesota State University). My wife (Shirley Busch, AHS 1961) and I decided to return to Iowa. Our first home after college was in West Des Moines. Then came an opportunity in 1968 to return "HOME" to Ames and work in a new area at the Iowa State Highway Commission. Little did I know that would be the first of several roles, which would lead to a satisfying 35-year career at the Iowa DOT.

As we participated in school activities through the years with our kids (Chris, AHS 1985, and Lisa, AHS 1986), we were joined by many others with Ames roots. Often their playmates were children of people we had known in school. They even had some of the same teachers and administrators we had. It was fun watching them enjoy activities we loved as we grew up in Ames and attended Ames High. Many of our family activities were the same also. Band concerts and frequent visits to Brookside Park were family favorites. We perhaps appreciated the excellent schools more as parents than we did as students.

We loved growing up in Ames, but as adults we are often reminded our town is constantly changing, as we are. However, even with the many differences, we always enjoy the historical perspective we have from growing up here. Not everyone knows where Moore Dairy was or that AHS had great football and track right where Target once stood! As Ames natives we had special appreciation for the hard work that went into transforming the old Ames High School building into the present city hall.

Watching changes has brought mixed emotions. Ames evolved through the years from a quiet place, especially in the summer, to a bustling city welcoming world-renown entertainment and athletics, as well as some major industry. AHS has also seen many changes, one of the most notable being the addition of girls' athletics. We saw first-hand what a great experience that was for our daughter and so many other girls. So while we sometimes long for the quiet small-town feel of our youth, I realize many of the opportunities Ames now offers are only possible because of its growth. Hearing the comments of those returning for reunions brings an awareness of how dramatic these changes have been.

My career at the Iowa DOT was a great experience. Several things stand out. First, my various roles provided me with opportunities to work with many other cities in Iowa. I realized through those experiences my hometown was as outstanding as I thought it was growing up. Second, it was a unique experience to work along side many others who grew up in Ames. I worked with not only past classmates, but also their parents and in some cases their children. Our shared backgrounds enriched my work life and reinforced my assessment of how well AHS students are prepared for life.

I continue to appreciate the many ways Ames natives contribute to maintaining and building upon the rich heritage of their hometown. It has been rewarding to live, work and be part of all that makes Ames the special place it is.

AHS '55ers Celebrate 75th Birthday



If northern California is bear country, Lake Tahoe must be its epicenter.

We were promised nocturnal bears roaming the streets around the lake, but all we got was Winnie the Pooh (more or less).

Never mind.

How can anyone be disappointed when celebrating their 75th birthday on that wonderful shimmering lake (especially under a full moon in the shadow of "The Godfather")?

No one saw a bear, but the 51 classmates and partners who spent the last four days of September here for the 75th birthday of the Ames High Class of 1955 were richly rewarded.



They soaked up the history, geology and beauty of the lake and its environs. And they got an up close look at the boulders and mountains that bedeviled the wagon trains struggling to get to California even before the gold rush of 1849.

All of this courtesy of Richard B. (Dick) and Marcia Kay (Wilsie) Campbell, who planned and orchestrated the entire production. (They claimed the presence of a full moon was coincidental, but no one bought that story.)

Here's what we did in a nutshell: We had an opening reception at the Campbell's home on Thursday. The next day we took a leisurely 3.5-hour cruise around the lake under azure skies on the Tahoe Gal (a faux paddleboat, staffed by an ever-accommodating crew).

That same evening, the Campbells mounted a ribs and chicken barbecue at their home without any public speeches. There were plenty of anecdotes and tales (some tall) about feats and embarrassments from the deep past.

One such story came from Beverley (Ogg) Stone, who was the first Marilyn on "The Munsters" TV program. She confessed to

having blown an entrance at Ames High during the junior class play, "Our Town." No reason to explain what she was doing, but, as Emily Webb, she left Campbell (Joe Stoddard) and

Kenneth Larson (Sam Craig) standing in the grave yard wondering what to do or say during the ever-expanding pause.

Suffice it to say, Beverley (Emily) eventually showed up and received a royal dressing down afterwards from Virginia Batstone, the AHS drama teacher.

(Beverley said she only ever missed one other entrance in her entire acting career.)

Saturday's picnic saw the venue switch to Donner Lake, almost too close to the site where the ill-fated party of 87 men, women and children got trapped by snow (including 10-foot high drifts) in November 1846. Three unsuccessful efforts were made to send supplies to the Donner party. They were only rescued in February 1847, but not before some members of the party had been eaten by the starving survivors. Only 48 members of the Donner party (including children) lived through the ordeal.

The evening dinner was a typical sit-down affair with the women wearing snappy, even fashionable, clothes (some with bangles) that made the men look pretty average.

Classmate Bob Bragonier introduced the group to his view of jazz in a slide-music-narrative presentation (*Jazz, Poetry and Art*).

Highlight of Sunday's brunch was Bob Walkup, who was mayor of Tucson when Congresswoman Gabby Giffords was shot point blank in a supermarket parking lot just outside the city in January 2011.

Bob described the successful efforts he and Giffords had made previously to establish trauma centers in hospitals surrounding Tucson. When she was shot two surgeons from one of those newly established trauma units was at her side and saved Giffords's life.

Walkup also said dealing with the news media (national and international) was a paramount concern. But, he said, he saw his first priority as reporting to the Obama White House what had happened.

These briefings led to a trip to the White House and consultations with

the President and other mayors about how to prevent (and cope with) similar tragedies.

On a lighter note, classmates shared stories (both at the brunch and throughout the weekend) about

everything from climbing the water tower opposite Welch School to putting pennies on the CNW railroad tracks to Carr's Pool and Moore's Dairy, as well as the mysterious tunnel between Central and Ames High.

And, of course, no AHS '55 get together would be complete without a recapitulation of what the Ames Tribune described, on 27 May 1955, as "one of the greatest athletic years in the history of the school." That included winning the Central Iowa Conference in football, followed by state championships in basketball and both indoor and outdoor track.

All of this plus praise galore for the Campbells and the Tahoe experience.

As for the bears – or lack thereof – we turn to that chapter in "Winnie the Pooh" entitled "Eeyore Has a Birthday."

In this episode, Owl attempts to write Happy Birthday – but his effort reads as follows: "Hippy Papy Bthuthdth Thuthdy Bthuthdy."

For our 75th birthday, the "card" read:

HIPPY BATDAY
AHS 1955

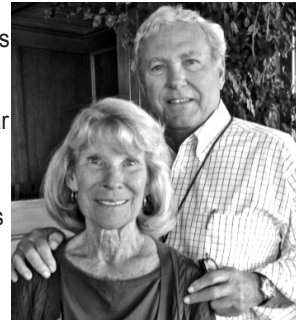
STILL SHARP AS A TACK
