



Class of 1957 Plans Reunion





Memories of growing up in Ames!

Memory No. 1: Grade school for me was at Beardshear Elementary School, and I lived between Main Street and Fifth. It was about an eight-block walk which was shortened slightly by cutting through Bandshell Park. There was a gas station across the street from the park that occasionally provided a candy bar, but that's not what this story about.

Walking home from school one day with one of my classmates, the name of whom I cannot remember, I was invited to see the rabbit hutch in the backyard of his home. I thought that was pretty neat, but when he offered to give me one of the little rabbits, I was thrilled. I wasn't sure how my parent would take that but I was going to find out. Happily, my parents were very receptive to the idea of having a rabbit living in the enclosed back porch of our house. My dad built some kind of a little pen and there the rabbit grew and flourished.

One day I got home from school and, as usual, I went to check on my rabbit. The rabbit was gone. I don't remember being very disturbed with that, but I must have been. My parents consoled me with the thought that, after all, it was a wild animal and it must have

gotten loose. Either that day or within a couple of days we had stifatho for dinner. That's a Greek stew that you can make with any kind of meat (we often had chicken) and small onions flavored with cinnamon, cloves, bay leaves and tomato sauce. My mother was a great cook and that was one of my favorites. As I was munching away, I came to a small bone that turned out to be part of a mandible. Well, I know it was part of the mandible because it had teeth. I was probably in second or third grade, but it still seemed strange to me. I asked: "Mom. chickens don't have teeth, do they?" My sister, who was about three years older and considerably smarter, blurted out: "THE RABBIT!" That's what rabbits were for in my dad's village, Roumiri, located close to Kalamata. We also had a pet pigeon while at that house. That's another story, but I can tell you we never ate it.

It had the aerodynamics of a rock. Try it again; same rock. Again. Rock. Lesson learned? Perhaps. I never bought anything from a barker at the state fair.

Friendships afresh & re-kindled --

Class of '85 does Las Vegas, Ninja style

When the Iowa State football schedule came out in 2019 the game that jumped off the page was UNLV in Las Vegas, and a germ of an idea started forming about getting a group together for that game. Circumstances changed. In addition to a truncated football schedule, the class of 1985 lost out on a reunion - which have always been spectacularly planned and hugely attended. So, when the UNLV game popped back up for Sept. 18, 2021, a small group of us decided to shift our 35th from Ames to Vegas.

But this isn't really a story about football, Las Vegas, Organizational Ninjas or people who were willing to put themselves out there financially based on the assumption that people who said "yeah, get me 10 tickets" were actually going to pay for 10 tickets. What it is is a story about a group of people, some of whom have known each other since kindergarten, and the genuine affection we have for one another. What that affection produced, in this case, was a locust-like swarm of almost 100 Ames High alum (mostly from '84 and '85) and spouses and friends of friends descending on an unsuspecting little town in the middle of the desert from lowa and 11 other states - including California and the District of Columbia.

A group of us arrived at approximately the same time on Thursday of Game Week and thanks to social media (more on that later) we arranged to meet at baggage claim. The first thing that I noticed upon landing was that in the ten or so years since I had been there, McCarran Airport had undergone an "Angry Bruce Banner-Style Metamorphosis." What was once a compact and convenient airport had become enormous and out of control.

The upshot of this growth spurt was that baggage claim was no longer a shared entity by all airlines but now located in two, separate, terminals

Stories were told, laughs were abundant, memories of those of us no longer with us were shared, \$28 margaritas were spilled and then miraculously un-spilled, but most of all it became clear that we were a very lucky group of people. I've always thought that Ames is a special place and we re-discovered in those first few hours that time and distance have done nothing to diminish the love we share for one another and how fortunate we are to be such a close group who have Ames and Ames High in common.

A few things about Vegas before I get back to the important stuff...It's hot, it's EXPENSIVE, and it's way bigger than you remember, so if you happen to miss the bus leaving the game on Saturday with a dead phone, you're in for a LONG walk (more on that later). As far as I could tell, gambling was far down the list of priorities for most of us as we had an almost constant stream of updates on the group via Facebook about what people were doing and

We probably offended everyone within earshot, but I am hard pressed to remember laughing more. Many stories of the late, great, Marty Kiser dominated the conversation. I wish I could report on the goings-on of others. but word count compels me to skip to Game Day.

Game Day dawned hot, dry and sunny (duh), auguring well for lowa State's passing attack although the Death Star, as Allegiant Stadium is known to the locals, is an indoor arena. The tailgate,

held at the outdoor theater immediately between the hotels, was arranged by Mark Malenchik, who rather cryptically explained that he "knew someone." Great food and music and probably the first time during the weekend that the whole group was in one place at one time. From there we boarded our three buses and it was off to the Death Star.

The game itself wasn't much to speak of. Iowa State dominated on the field and their fans dominated in the stands, as attendance was announced as 35,200 or 54% of capacity and I estimate that we and other ISU fans comprised about 75% of that number. After the game we all piled back on the buses for the ride back to the hotel except one of us. One poor soul lost his Bus Buddy and followed the wrong red shirts, eventually getting hopelessly lost and walking, dead phone in hand, all the way back to the hotel. At one point this poor unfortunate managed to somehow lose sight of the strip and eventually had to ask someone how to get back. The response was "that way," which happened to be the exact opposite direction I, I mean whoever it was, was walking. Order was eventually restored and again, eventually, a good laugh was had by all. The shin splints lasted about a week.

I think if there is any substantial takeaway from the fact that we all ended up *en masse* for a football game, it is that it wasn't for a football game. What it was was that dozens of years and thousands of miles didn't matter. What mattered was that we all have that one thing in common: coming from a very special town where we forged, literally, lifelong friendships.

Social media made it easier for this to happen as did Nancy's hotel magic, John's faith in humanity in purchasing 96 tickets at \$125 on spec, and Mark's ability to create a fantastic tailgate and bus transport at literally the last minute. But what really mattered was that we love each other. We are family. I would rather be from no place other than Ames, lowa.

The Noteables

The Noteables formed in 1965 in Ames, lowa with band members from Ames High School and lowa State University. While most of the members had their start in other bands, this was a new endeavor for a couple of the members. As members graduated from lowa State and began leaving the area, as well as losing a few to the on-going Viet Nam War, the band went through several transitions. There were 14 different people who played in the band at one time or another. Eventually, the core group of band


members included:

The band members were extremely versatile and could switch between many different instruments which allowed them to play a wide variety of music. The Noteables were popular throughout Central Iowa, and especially in the Ames area where they played for numerous dances and parties for lowa State fraternities and sororities, as well as dances at the ISU Memorial Union. In 1968, the Noteables were selected to perform on ABC's nationally televised "Happening '68" in Los Angeles, California, a

program hosted by Paul Revere and the Raiders. The group made three separate appearances on Happening '68, which was a competition show similar to battle of the bands.

The Noteables were inducted into the Iowa Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in a ceremony held at Arnold's Park over

the 2013 Labor Day weekend. The members who were inducted were: Mark Heggen, Mark Ritland, Dave Fincham, Lindy and Stewart Buck, John and Jim Quam and Charlie Sivesind. (Lindy Buck and Charlie Sivesind were honored posthumously!)

Ames skaters swarmed to Brookside Park Thursday for the first full day of skating on the flooded tennis-basketballbadminton courts. The courts. which are almost the size of a football field in area, were flooded Wednesday under the direction of the city recreation commission. Other Ames youngsters scorned the luxury of the flooded tennis courts at Brookside Park and skated on Squaw Creek where it runs through the park. The ice here was favorable to skating because of successive freezing of the creek.

1975: Surpassing expectations, the 1975 Little Cyclone basketball squad emerged as the state runner-up in Iowa losing to the undefeated Des Moines Lincoln team 56-51 in the state tournament finals and finishing the 74-75 season with a 21-3 record. "This has to be the most satisfying year in my ten years of coaching," commented Arnie Zediker. With only three returning lettermen off the 14-8 of the previous year, hopes for a loop title and, least of all, of a state title seemed dim. However, junior 6'7" Chuck Harmison provided the main punch for the offense as he dominated the scoring and rebounding categories and ranked as one of the state's premiere centers and was selected for the All-Tournament Team.

1976: With three starters returning from the runner-up squad of 1975, pressure for a gold trophy began to build. "We knew we had the potential to win it all," commented Chuck Harmison. "It was just a matter of proving it to everyone." From the first poll in November, to the final buzzer of the state championship game, Ames was ranked number one. The majority of the season saw the Little Cyclones completely dominating their opponents and winning by an average of 21 points per game. The state championship was the climax to a near perfect season which saw the cage team go 24-0 and claim the state title by 27 points against an outclassed Marshalltown team. Chuck Harmison and Joel Morton were named to the All-Tournament Team. "A season like we had is the dream of every coach," said Arnie Zediker.

Currently, an inventory of all items—trophies, pictures, banners, memorabilia, signs, etc.--is being collected.


