The Play that Almost Wasn't

In the late winter of my senior year at Ames High, I anticipated a carefree spring with an easy class load and no obligations. My high school sweetheart, Prue Campbell, had other plans for me when she coaxed me into trying out for the senior class play. Going with her request, I anticipated at most a small speaking part. When the cast roster was posted, however, Mr. Hamilton, the drama coach, had cast me in the lead male role of Mr. Appopolous. The play was *My Sister Eileen* and I was to play a feisty landlord in New York City with a Greek accent.


(My acting career at that time had been brief – a junior high play where I bailed when the script called for me to kiss a girl.)

Little did I know that the fun was just beginning.

Rehearsals went fine for weeks until April 14, four days before the play was to open at the Ames High Auditorium. My girlfriend did not even get a role and worked on the crews, but she was proud of me. I was busy memorizing lines and learning acting from Mr. Hamilton. All was going well.

Then, on that fateful day, one of the cast members left a backstage hot plate on after rehearsal. During the night, that hot plate sparked into a fire which burned out the stage area, including all the scenery, props, and even the curtain.

Still uncertain about my prowess as an actor, I was left with mixed feelings. On one hand, I sensed divine intervention about to save me from being a flop on opening night. On the other hand, the cast

and crew had worked so hard for weeks to create a very good production. Emergency meetings brought the decision by Principal Adams and Mr. Hamilton that “the show must go on!”

But when? And where?

It was decided to keep the original opening night of April 18, 1958 and to hold the performance at the newest school in Ames, Edwards Elementary School. Edwards had a rather small but lovely auditorium with intimate seating. As a cast and crew, we scurried to create new scenery and props and rehearse on the new stage.

Opening night was a big success, I turned out to be a passable

actor, and my sweetheart Prue was pleased and impressed. Fine performances the next two nights led to a wonderful cast party where we all felt special as Ames High students because we had “Aimed High” and overcome trouble together.

The potential disaster of the Senior Class Play of 1958 had an aftermath in that we had no auditorium in which to graduate later that spring. In late May, we graduated outdoors at the football stadium, which is now about where the Hobby Lobby store is located.

Our play has become a cherished memory of dear old Ames High.

Class of 1992 Reunion

She and her family lived on a farm on Dayton Road east of town. From there to the high school on Sixth and Clark was a little far to walk. So, she drove a horse and buggy to school each day. In rain, cold, snow, sleet or heat she hitched her horse to the open buggy for the four-mile round trip. School lunch programs didn't exist then, so she brought her lunch with her. During the lunch hour she usually had time to walk the half block to where her horse was stabled to be sure the horse was well fed

too. After graduation, she enrolled at Iowa State College where she majored in math and science. Coeds were in the minority then; she was one of only 200 women students in a 1,000 man student body.

Other News About Our Graduates

Donald Finnegan, '74 won a state wrestling championship at Ames High and had a standout career as an Iowa State wrestler. These days, he is watching his four daughters in a sport that requires the same determination. Now living in St. Louis, he watched his 15-year old daughter, Sarah, qualify for the U.S. Olympic gymnastics trials in mid-June. The Finnegans plan their summers around gymnastics, and now will be heading to San Jose, California for the Trials on June 29 and July 1, 2012.

Steven Herrnstadt, '71 was one of five Iowa State faculty members that were awarded the title of Distinguished University Professor in the Spring of 2012. They will be honored at a university awards ceremony on September 21, 2012. Distinguished Professor awards are given to full professors whose contributions to their academic disciplines are recognized nationally or internationally. The awards are bestowed for exceptional contributions to the university.

Herrnstadt, a professor of art and design, has used his expertise to integrate art and design with digital technology, creating ever-changing opportunities for faculty, students

and staff in the College of Design and beyond. For example, he and an undergraduate student created the first computer animation at Iowa State University in the 1980s. He is a founding faculty member of the interdisciplinary graduate program in human computer interaction. He helped the biology faculty create Meta!Blast, the educational video game with accurate 3D representations of cell parts, and he has an ongoing role in the biological and premedical illustration program to keep its digital illustration techniques up to date.

Mark H. Hamilton, '67, a 1971 graduate of Grinnell College, was one of ten alumni recognized for professional accomplishment and service contribution during Alumni Reunion Weekend. Alumni Award winners are members of reunion classes who have distinguished themselves in their careers and communities and embody Grinnell's mission of lifelong learning and service. Hamilton received an award for advancing community journalism.

Ethan Dunham, '98 participated in an alumni book signing at his 10-year class reunion at Carleton College in Northfield, Minnesota.

His book, "Burn Your Resume," co-written with Paul Frankenberg, is focused on helping college students and recent college graduates maximize their career potential through practical, how-to strategies and tactics for igniting their careers. Dunham is also a graduate of Harvard University and the Owen School of Management at Vanderbilt University. He is the son of Warren and Connie Dunham of Ames.

Jessica Miller Clem, '90 spoke at the Mary Greeley Medical Center Foundation's Annual Benefit about her experiences at the William R. Bliss Cancer Center where she had been an oncology patient for nearly twelve years fighting two bouts with cancer. She had ended her treatments and was receiving HOMEWARD Hospice care. DISCOVERING AN AMES ICON

During a recent visit to the Polk City Nursing and Rehabilitation Center, I discovered a real and very much alive Ames icon of the 1940s and '50s.

Now wearing a bright red shirt and baseball cap, his attire for the day back then might have been a black cowboy hat, black pants, black cowboy boots, and twin holsters containing shiny six shooters reminiscent of Gene Autry. Remember him? He is Martin Pappadolos, affectionately known at the time as "Spiget."

At 89 years of age, his dark eyes still sparkle and his grin is as broad as the Main Street he remembers in much detail and talks about freely.

Martin grew to love Ames while working as a team member at Frangos Restaurant and living above the downtown cafe.

Pappadolos recalls the main street of his home town with much accuracy: The Collegian Theater (THE most beautiful), The Capitol Theater (10 cent tickets, 5 cent candy machine and his favorite Gene Autry show), Carr Hardware, Stover's Lounge, The Overland Café and Bus Depot (at the west end of Main Street where recruits and the drafted reported at 5 a.m. for transport to boot camp) and the Sportsman's Lounge (intact today and seemingly unchanged).

Martin is so well known for his self-created personas, all with a happy-go-lucky manner coupled with an unequaled ability to enact the most surprising practical jokes, ever.

He has spent many of his past years in the care of his sister Thelma and also in rehabilitation since suffering serious injuries received while crossing a very busy Ames Main Street about 35 years ago.

Today there is still that twinkle, wide grin and unmistakable laugh.

If you happen to see Pappadolos as I recently did, do not ask him "What's up?" He just might be saving that for your next surprise.

Ames High and the NBA Draft

Harrison Barnes '10 was destined to be in the NBA. After all, even before he was born, his mother, Shirley, videotaped Chicago Bulls games so a son she one day hoped to have would be able to watch Michael Jordan and try to emulate his style of play. And when he was born, one of the names she gave Harrison was Jordan.

So, when the Golden State Warriors selected Barnes with the seventh pick in the 2012 NBA Draft on June 28, 2012, the choice was only a fulfillment of a destiny as well as a dream.

Barnes had dreamed of playing in the NBA since he was young, inspired by those videos of a soaring Jordan leading the Bulls to six

NBA championships. That's why Barnes worked on his game almost constantly, developing a work ethic that was second to none.

Barnes, who led Ames High to back-to-back undefeated state championships in 2009 and 2010, is the first Little Cyclone drafted by the NBA since Fred Hoiberg '91 was a second-round pick in 1995. Before that, Dick Gibbs '67 had been a third-round pick by the Bulls in 1971.

Barnes, who, by the way, is a former Tribune carrier, can only hope his NBA career takes him as far as Gibbs' did. Gibbs was a member of the Washington Bullets team that played in the NBA Finals but lost ... to the Golden State Warriors, which now is Barnes' team. Coincidence?

The first Ames High graduate in the NBA draft was Gene West '61. Drafted in the 7th round, 71st pick by the Philadelphia 76ers. He opted to play for the Phillips 66 Oilers, coached by Gary Thompson.

Gene West played college basketball for Drake, Dick Gibbs for Texas Western, Fred Hoiberg for Iowa State and Harrison Barnes for North Carolina.

We are preparing for a 9-day Olympics visit by our 18-year-old grandson Ryan and his friend, Tyler.

Serena's fifth singles title was cheered enthusiastically. But it wasn't always that way.

We were around when, as teenagers, Venus and Serena first played at Wimbledon (1998-2002) under the watchful eye of their father, Richard.

Watchful eye doesn't come close to describing his presence. Better to say Richard was a protective bully with chips on both shoulders. He saw discrimination or non-appreciation around almost every corner.

The English press responded in kind. Some of this might have been because the girls were Black, but a good deal had to do with Richard's blustering complaints.

I can recall one columnist asserting that the girls were unfairly intimidating their opponents by exposing their massively muscled shoulders at a time when proper tennis players did not go to the gym.


It took a couple of years before Richard eventually shut his gob and Wimbledon fans recognized the talent, excitement – and personality -- that Venus and Serena brought to the game.

From then on, the Williams sisters became starlets and then stars.

At age 30, Serena has a real challenge if she hopes to equal Martina Navratilova's nine singles championships at Wimbledon.

But you can bet that the fans on Centre Court will be rooting for her all the way.

Ames High Athletics 1965 – 1970

The period of Ames High athletics from 1965 to 1970 saw the retirement of two long time coaches. Hi Covey retired from coaching after the 1970 season having won 8 outdoor state track championships and 9 state indoor championships. Ray Smalling retired after the 1968 baseball season. He started the program in 1955, won one state championship and five CIC championships. In fourteen years he had only one losing season. Four Hall of Famers emerged from this era, 1966 – Richard Agard, Ed Huffman, 1968 – Rick Engel and 1970 – Karl Schloerke.

1965-1966 Heavyweight Ed Huffman was our first state champion in wrestling for new coach Jack Mendenhall. Other champions included the State Mile Race Team in the fall and the CIC Track champions in the spring. The football team, under coach Cecil Spatcher, compiled a 5-2-2 record while playing two home games at Iowa State's Clyde Williams Field. They finished the home season at their new Ames High Stadium field. Coach George Duvall's basketball team finished the regular season at 13-5. Rich Agard set a CIC scoring record with a 26.5 average. Lyle Fitzgerald started the swimming program with a 1-7 record. Baseball experienced its first losing record at 8-10.

1966-1967 The Duvall led basketball team nearly brought home a state championship, losing to Cedar Rapids Jefferson 72-71. They were led by Ron Watson and Dick Gibbs. Gibbs played several years in the NBA. The football team had All-CIC Ron Watson. They finished 2-6-1. New coach

Harlan Milliken led the cross country and track teams. Cross Country finished second at State. Lyle Fitzgerald's swimmers had a much improved 8-3 dual meet record. Jim Friest was named the new tennis coach. Mike Beman and Bill Good made All-CIC on an 11-8 baseball team.

1967-1968 Harlan Millikin's track team won the State Outdoor Championship. Two relays were won at state, Harry Hannusch, Steve Lovely, Greg Mulhall Owen Austrheim in the 440 Relay and Lovely, Megregian, Dave Bliss and Austrheim in the 880 Relay. They also took second in the State Indoor where Greg Dengler won the Mile. Cross Country brought another state championship, led by Greg Dengler and Dave Powell. The tennis team (9-2), coached by Dale Tramp, featured Dave Hammer who was 9-0 in dual competition. Phil Johnson's first year as football saw a 7-2 record led by second team all-state Chris Haugen. George Duvall's golf team won the state championship. In wrestling Owen Austrheim was state champ at 127 and posted a 22-0 record. The swimming team was the CIC champion while baseball was 12-11 led by Hall of Famer Rick Engel. Engel and Dave Bliss were the leaders on the basketball team. It was a great year.

1968-1969 The State championship Cross Country was led all season by Dave Powell and Tom Montag. They followed that up by winning the Indoor title at state. Football was 5-3-1 in their first Big 8 year. QB Dan Craig was second team All-State. Senior Jim Ryan led the 12-11 basketball team. The

swimmers had a 12-2 dual meet record and won the Big 8 title. Coach Duvall's golf team was 6-2-1. In baseball Scott Milliken threw a no-hitter in Arnie Zediker's first year. Their record was 14-12.

1969-1970 LB Doug Fosberg was a 3rd team All-Stater for the 4-5 AHS football team. This was John Sletten's first year as cross country and track coach. The cross country was third and the track team 6th in state competition. Gerry Seifert was a state champ in wrestling. Coach Mendenhall's grapplers had a 5-6-1 dual meet record. First year swim coach Mike Wittmer won a Big 8 title. Basketball won the Big 8 title. Gene Larson was 3rd All-State. He and Scott Burgason were the leading scorers on a 20-5 team. Coach Duvall's golfers finished fourth at State. The tennis team was led by Jim Dickson and Al Vandeventer. Scott Milliken and Scott Burgason were a righty lefty combination as pitchers for a 16-15 baseball team. Hi Covey finished out his Ames coaching career as an assistant in track.
